Overview

The primary goals of pandemic influenza preparedness and response are to minimize serious illnesses and deaths and to curtail societal disruption. Each Kansas community should have a contingency plan uniquely developed and coordinated by all levels of community stakeholders. These stakeholders should represent a wide variety of professions and occupations from all areas of health, public safety, business, government, and the community. As recent disasters have shown, each community must be independently prepared to mitigate at least the initial impacts of a disaster, such as an influenza pandemic, since external resources and support might not be immediately available.

Presentations at these conferences meet the general principals of emergency response: preparedness, response and recovery. Each session will assist and facilitate appropriate planning for disease pandemics by addressing one or more of the following components: recognition/treatment/alerting/response to a pandemic disease outbreak, roles and responsibilities, community leadership, containment, surveillance, economic impact, business continuity, hospital safeguards, self care, and grief and loss.

All participants will receive transcripts of presentations, planning checklists and other documents.

Target Audiences

This conference is designed for physicians, nurses, advanced registered nurse practitioners, pharmacists, emergency medical services personnel, school nurses, school administrators, allied health and public health personnel, hospital administrators and staff, fire services, law enforcement, and community leaders/members.

Objectives

At the completion of this conference participants should be able to:

- Recognize signs of a pandemic disease outbreak.
- Describe the roles and responsibilities of health, public safety, community and government personnel when responding to an infectious disease pandemic.
- Be conversant with the Kansas Department of Health Environment's guidelines for containment and disease surveillance.
- Discuss key points of implementing business continuity measures.
- Describe the clinical, fiscal, and personnel ramifications of hospital surge capacity.
- Discuss components of home treatment and self care including ways to monitor and improve one's health and reduce the risk of further problems.
- Recognize the toll on the emotional and socio-economic capabilities of communities coping with losses resulting from pandemic disease outbreaks.
