TRAINING TRACKS



Law Enforcement Track

Tactical

This track prepares tactical team members to safely operate in the dangerous conditions surrounding response to a terrorist or other crime-related incidents.

Classroom training will be one full day on May 15 at the Kansas City Kansas Community College. Training will be designed to incorporate the needs of participating teams.

Deployment will include intense practical team operations in shifts beginning May 16 and continuing until all teams have completed operations. Teams will exercise in an abandoned building that will replicate a setting in which terrorist incidents have occurred.

Limited to 40 participants. Team registration is required for this track.

Explosive Ordnance Disposal (EOD)

This track prepares EOD team members to safely operate in the dangerous conditions surrounding response to actual terrorist and/or crime-related incidents employing explosive ordnance.

Classroom training will be one full day on May 17 at the Kansas City Kansas Community College. Training will incorporate the needs of participating teams.

Deployment will include intense team operations in shifts on May 18 at an abandoned building. This site will allow flexibility for teams to exercise a range of scenarios.

Limited to 40 participants. Team registration is required for this track.

Fire Technical Rescue Track (TRT)

This track prepares fire service responders with specialty rescue responsibilities to safely operate in the dangerous conditions inherent in a disaster site. Hands-on, practical training will be conducted for 6 skill stations. Each participant will rotate through the following skill stations:

1. Metal Cutting
2. Concrete Cutting
3. Extrication
4. Rigging
5. Confined Space Entry/Rescue
6. Technical Search/Structural Marking

Instruction for any participant is one full day only on May 15, May 16, or May 17 at the Unified Government Public Works Complex, 82nd Street & Riverview Ave., Kansas City, Kansas. Identical training will be offered on each day. Participants must choose only one day.

Limited to 30 participants per day on May 16, May 17, and May 18 for a total of 90 participants.

Note. Each participant must bring his/her own helmet, safety shoes, eye protection and gloves.

TRAINING TRACKS

Disaster Medicine Track

This track prepares EMS professionals and physicians in emergency and trauma medicine to work on field medicine functions in multidisciplinary teams. Topics include treatment and extrication of patients with severe injuries while working in confined spaces with limited accessibility and under stressful conditions.

Classroom instruction is three full days from May 15 through 17 at the Kansas City Kansas Community College. It will include hands-on training using lifelike simulations to prepare participants for the deployment phase. (Classroom hours: up to 19.5 CME hours and 23.4 EMS hours.)

Deployment to the simulated disaster site at Unified Government Public Works Complex, 82nd Street and Riverview Avenue, Kansas City, Kansas may be as long as 12 hours on May 18 or May 19. Participants must choose one day. Credit will be given based on hours of actual participation. (Drill: up to 12 CME hours and 14.4 EMS hours.)

Limited to 50 participants. There are only a few openings. **All registrants from the KU Medical Center September 2005 disaster drill are automatically pre-enrolled, but need to confirm attendance by completing the attached registration form.**

Note. This activity has been approved for up to 31.5 hours of AMA category 1 Continuing Medical Education credit, and up to 37.8 hours EMS credit. (Please note the accreditation statements in this brochure). Specific objectives and timed agendas will follow in confirmation letters to participants.



Command Track

This track prepares fire-rescue, law enforcement, emergency managers, school superintendents, and government leaders to direct disaster incident operations. This 8-hour class studies several major incidents in the United States with lessons learned from each. Topics will also include operating within a unified command system and ICS forms. Training will end with a tabletop exercise.

Classroom instruction for any participant is one full day only on May 17, May 18, or May 19 at the Kansas City Kansas Community College. Identical training will be offered on each day. Participants must choose only one day.

Participation at the simulated disaster site at Unified Government Public Works Complex, 82nd Street and Riverview Avenue, Kansas City, Kansas will be observational on May 15 or May 16. Participants must choose one day.

Limited to 50 participants per day on May 17, May 18, and May 19 for a total of 150 participants.



Community Track

This track is for nurses, hospital administrators, emergency managers, service agencies such as the American Red Cross and the Salvation Army, public health officials, public information officers, and others in the community who have roles in preparing for response to a mass-casualty disaster. Topics for this 8-hour class include the history and anatomy of disasters; disaster management; roles and responsibilities in multijurisdictional disaster response; federal, state, and local requirements and expectations; coordination and communication across jurisdictional lines; the command structure; and others.

Classroom instruction will be one full day on May 16 at the Kansas City Kansas Community College.

Limited to 50 participants.

Participation at the simulated disaster site at Unified Government Public Works Complex, 82nd Street and Riverview Avenue, Kansas City, Kansas will be observational on May 17, May 18 or May 19. Participants must choose one day.



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The University of Kansas Medical Center, in collaboration with Rescue Training Associates, will conduct disaster response training, ranging from basic to expanded levels, in the listed areas. Depending on the training track selected, some participants will exercise in a simulated rubble pile.

Five training tracks, of varying complexity, will be offered:

1. Disaster Medicine Track (expanded training)
2. Command Track (basic training)
3. Community Track (basic training)
4. Law Enforcement Track (expanded training)
5. Fire Technical Rescue Track (TRT-basic training)

This drill is made possible by a federal grant from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, Health Resource Services Administration, Health Care Systems Emergency Training Division.

Training Sites

Participants will train at sites best suited to accommodate their instruction.

1. Classroom training for Disaster Medicine, Command, Community, and Law Enforcement tracks will be held at the **Kansas City Kansas Community College, 7250 State Avenue, Kansas City, Kansas**. This training phase will range from one to three days, depending on the track.
2. The simulated disaster site for Disaster Medicine and Fire Technical Rescue tracks will be at the **Unified Government Public Works Complex, 82nd Street and Riverview Avenue, Kansas City, Kansas**. This training phase will consist of 8 to 12 hours, depending on the track. Participants in Command and Community tracks are welcome to observe disaster site operations on designated days described in the following sections.
3. Law Enforcement teams will exercise in an abandoned building which will replicate a setting in which terrorist incidents have occurred.

Training Specialists



Overall implementation of all training will be conducted by Rescue Training Associates (RTA) from Deerfield, Florida. RTA has assembled a team of instructors experienced by direct on-site involvement and leadership roles in some of the world's recent major disasters including the 9/11 terrorist attacks, the Oklahoma City bombing, 11 hurricanes (including Hurricane Katrina), the Value Jet crash, and an earthquake in Turkey.

Core Competencies

The following HRSA core competencies for terrorism response apply to each track:

- Recognize a terrorist event or other public health emergency.
- Meet the acute care needs of patients, including pediatric patients and vulnerable populations, in a safe and appropriate manner.
- Rapidly and effectively alert the public health system.
- Participate in a coordinated, multidisciplinary response.

Outcomes

The following outcomes are based on the over-arching National Incident Management System (NIMS) components for disaster drills. Outcomes reflect the full scope of the drill; however, not all outcomes apply to each track.

- Perform functions of command and management.
- Implement discipline-specific preparedness to terror response.
- Execute resource management and mutual aid.
- Implement appropriate information management.
- Employ supporting technologies as needed.
- Perform ongoing management and maintenance.



IMPORTANT INFORMATION FOR PARTICIPANTS

- Any individual who submitted a registration form for the KU Medical Center disaster drill held in September 2005, and who could not attend due to deployment to the Gulf States to provide hurricane relief will be automatically given priority status. Please indicate this on the attached registration form.
- All registrants in the Disaster Medicine track from the KU Medical Center September 2005 disaster drill are automatically pre-enrolled, but need to confirm attendance by completing and submitting the attached registration form.
- Each participant will receive a confirmation letter with additional information about the track selected, including times, locations, and corresponding lodging information. The Great Wolf Lodge is designated as the headquarters hotel. A list of other lodging choices will be mailed with confirmation letters.
- Each track is designed to accommodate a specific number of participants. Participation is limited. **Preregistration is required. There will be no on-site registration.**

Proof of Liability Coverage

All participants operating within the simulated disaster site assume all risk of injury and are required to sign the release statement on the registration page of this brochure. In addition, participants must provide a copy of their agency's proof of liability insurance prior to gaining access into the drill site. Agencies wishing to utilize RTA's liability insurance must provide contact information and pay all required fees. Contact Marta Skalacki at 913-588-4543 for more information.

If you have any doubts about your ability to participate in this drill, consultation with your physician is strongly encouraged.

Accreditation

Physicians. All physicians are required to sign attendance rosters once a day. Continuing education credit will be prorated according to documented attendance. The KU Medical Center Office of Continuing Medical Education is accredited by the Accreditation Council for Continuing Medical Education to provide continuing medical education for physicians. The KU Medical Center Office of Continuing Medical Education designates this educational activity for a maximum of 31.5 category 1 credits toward the AMA Physician's Recognition Award. Each physician should claim only those credits that he/she actually spent in the activity.

Note: This includes a maximum of 19.5 classroom hours and a maximum of 12 hours at the drill.

EMS. KU Medical Center's Eastern Kansas Area Health Education Center is an approved program provider by the Kansas Board of EMS. The Disaster Medicine Track is approved for 37.8 hours of continuing education credit. This includes 3 days of classroom training (23.4 hours) and up to 12 hours (14.4 contact hours) at the drill. Provider number is PP-4040.

Other professions who desire continuing education credit will receive a certificate of attendance that will list the drill track in which a participant was registered with topics and continuing education hours for that track.

The certificate may be submitted for relicensure.
